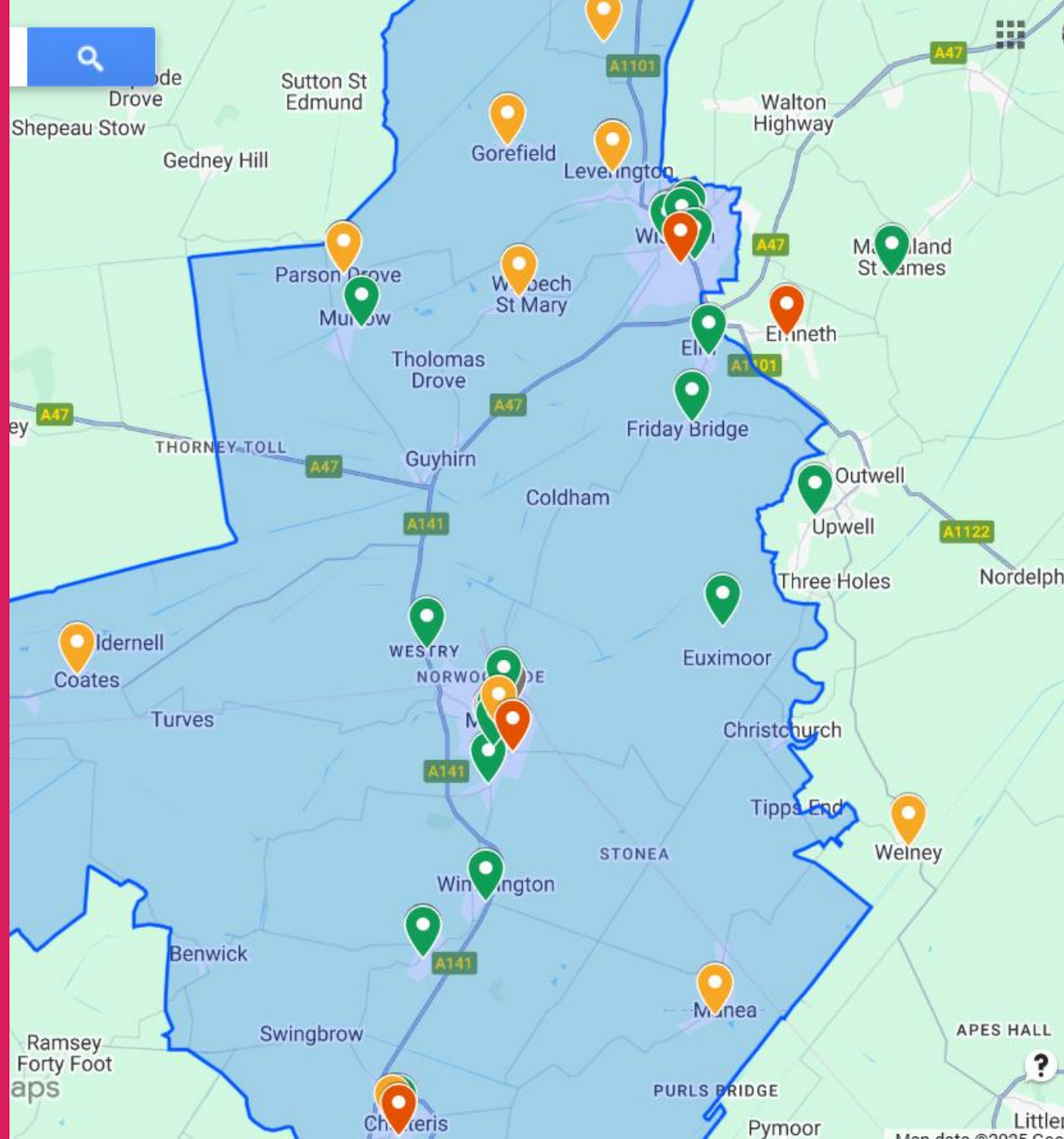

The social action network mapping of faith organisations fits the aims of the Faith and Society APPG:

1. Highlight the contribution to society by faith-based organisations
2. Faith groups as providers and advocates for the communities in which they serve
3. The Faith Covenant can be adopted by faith groups and local authorities across the UK
4. A joint commitment between faith communities and local authorities to a set of principles that guide engagement and practical working on all levels.

Action Networks

Our project can build, envision and equip faith-based social action networks under three categories: Food Security, Mental Health and Support for Children and Families. We achieve this by:

1. mapping the Faith-based social action in each local authority by telephone survey using a place-based surveyor from the faith community
2. gathering the Faith leaders to present the mapping and getting agreement for them to meet as a place-based network quarterly, coordinated by a steering team, for connecting and strategic planning
3. gathering the wider Faith community through a co-produced 'Celebration' event with VCFSE, civic and health organisations to catalyse cross-sector connections and partnerships around key action networks

Green = actively delivering services

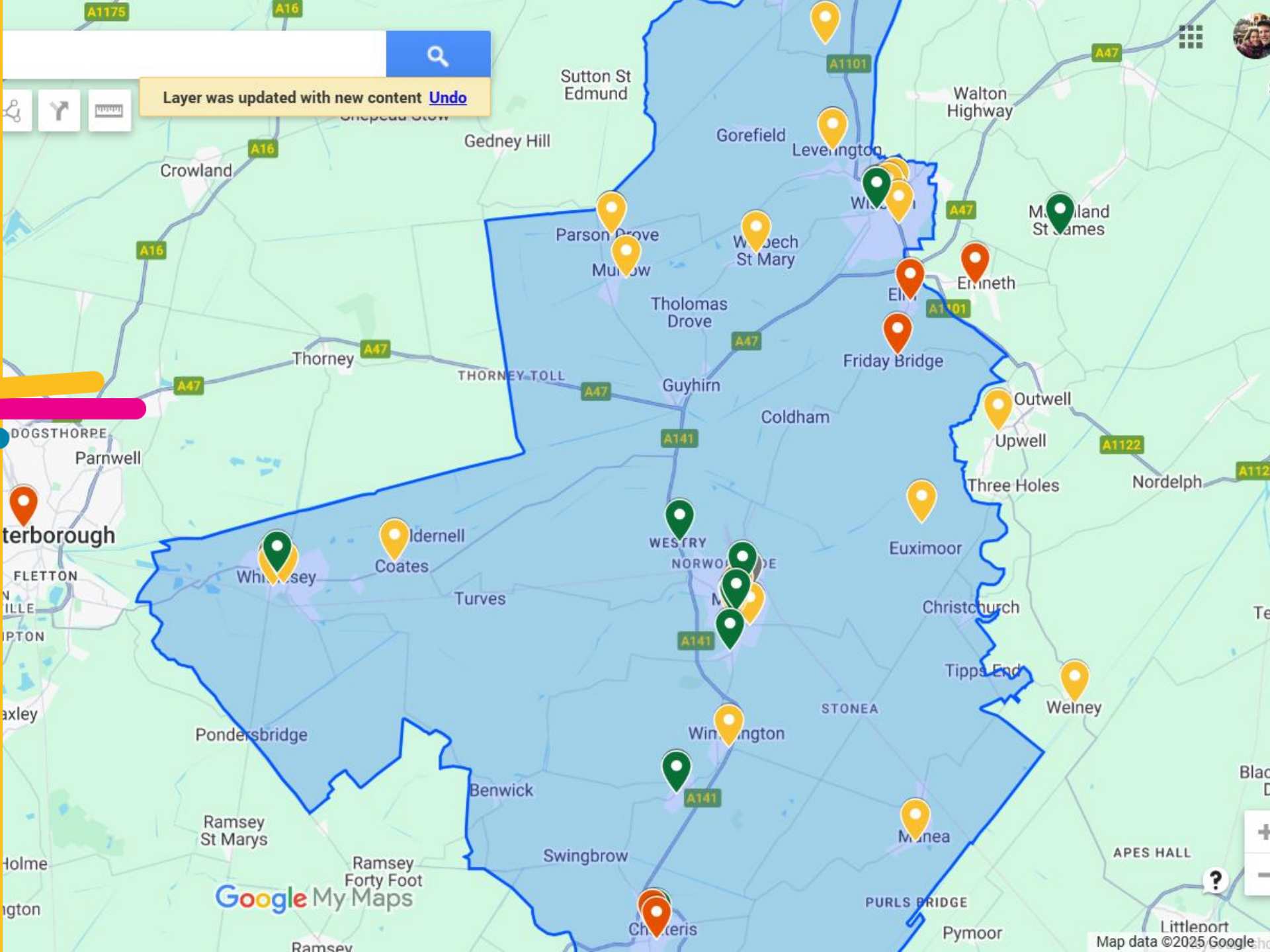

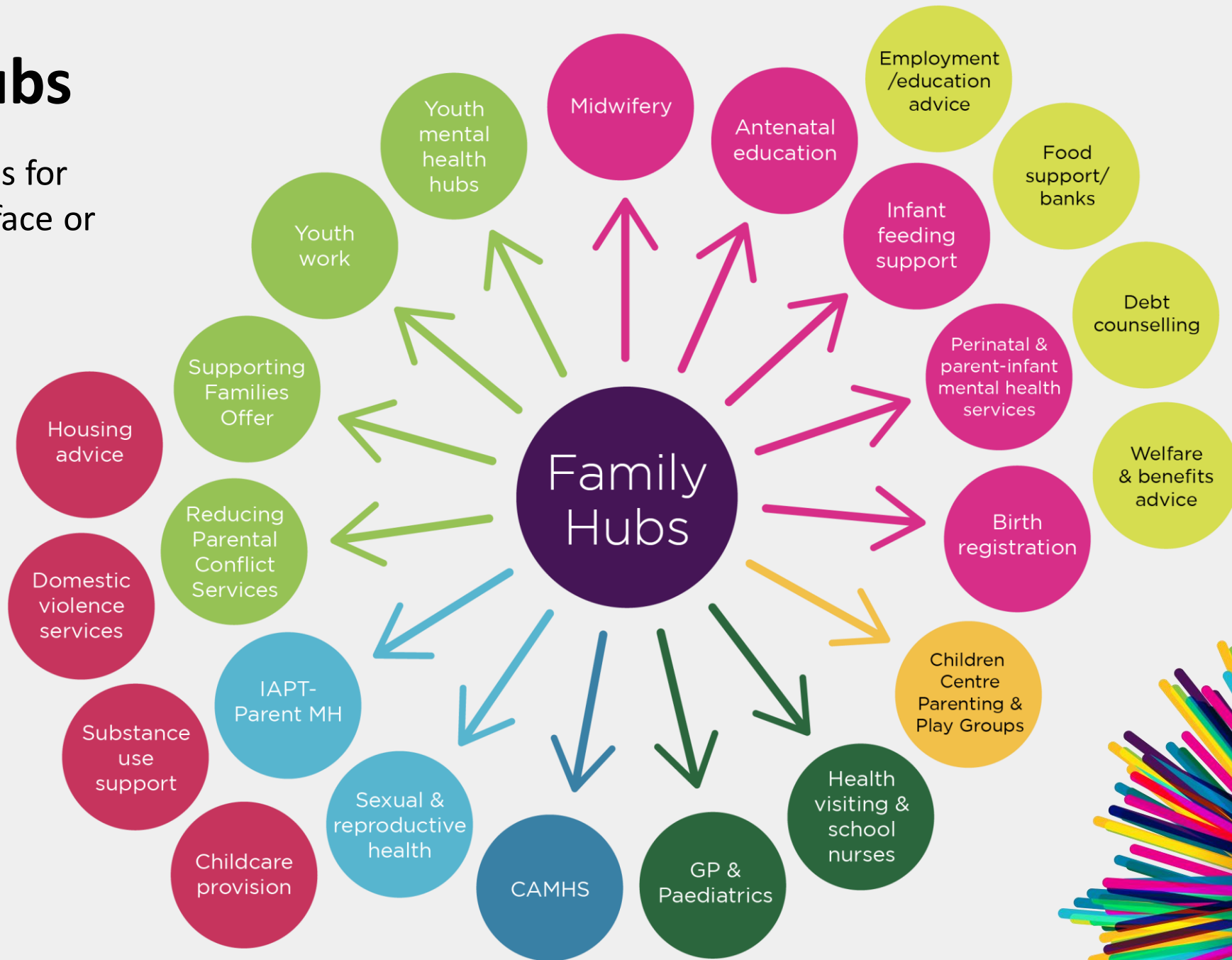

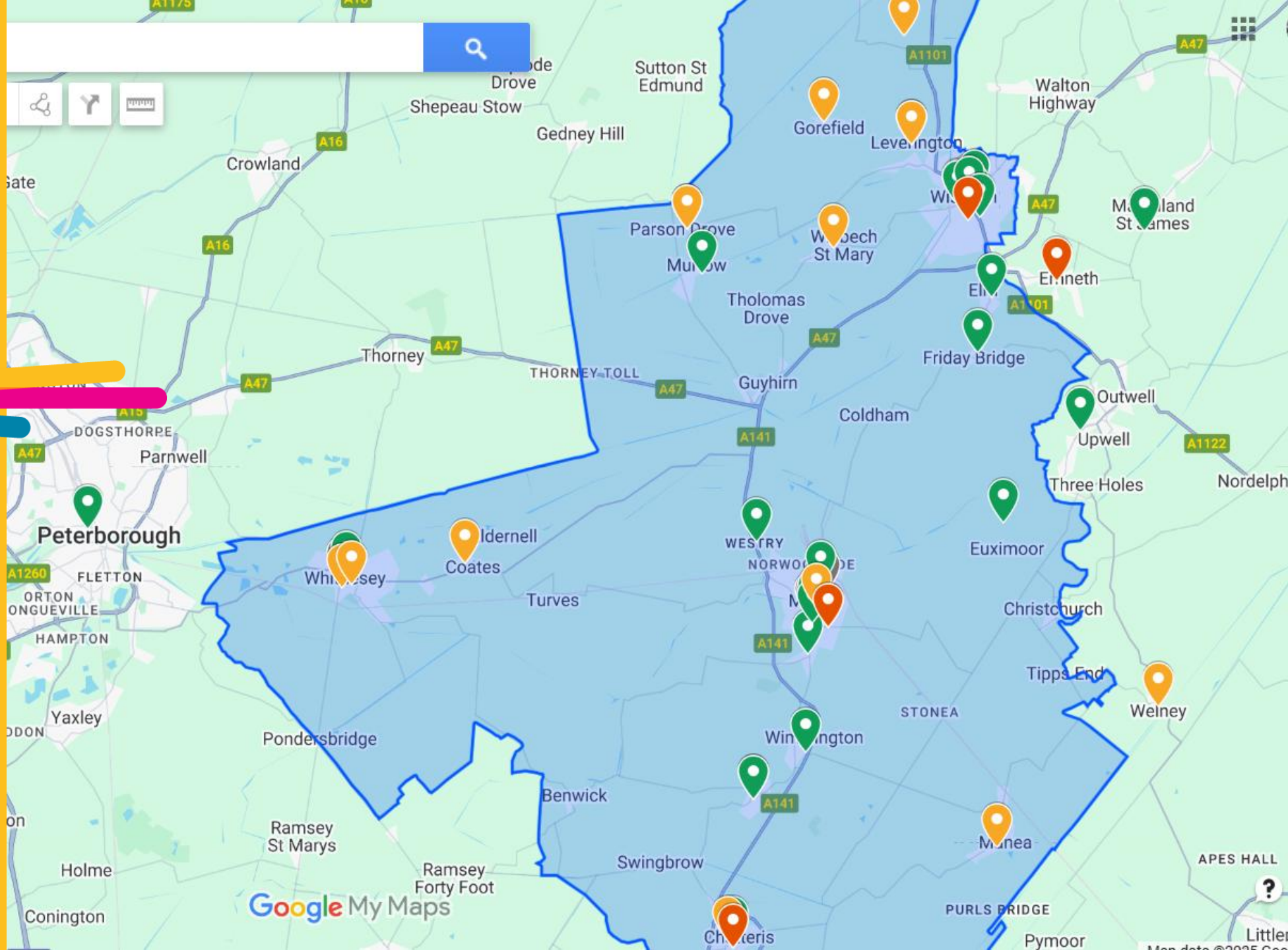

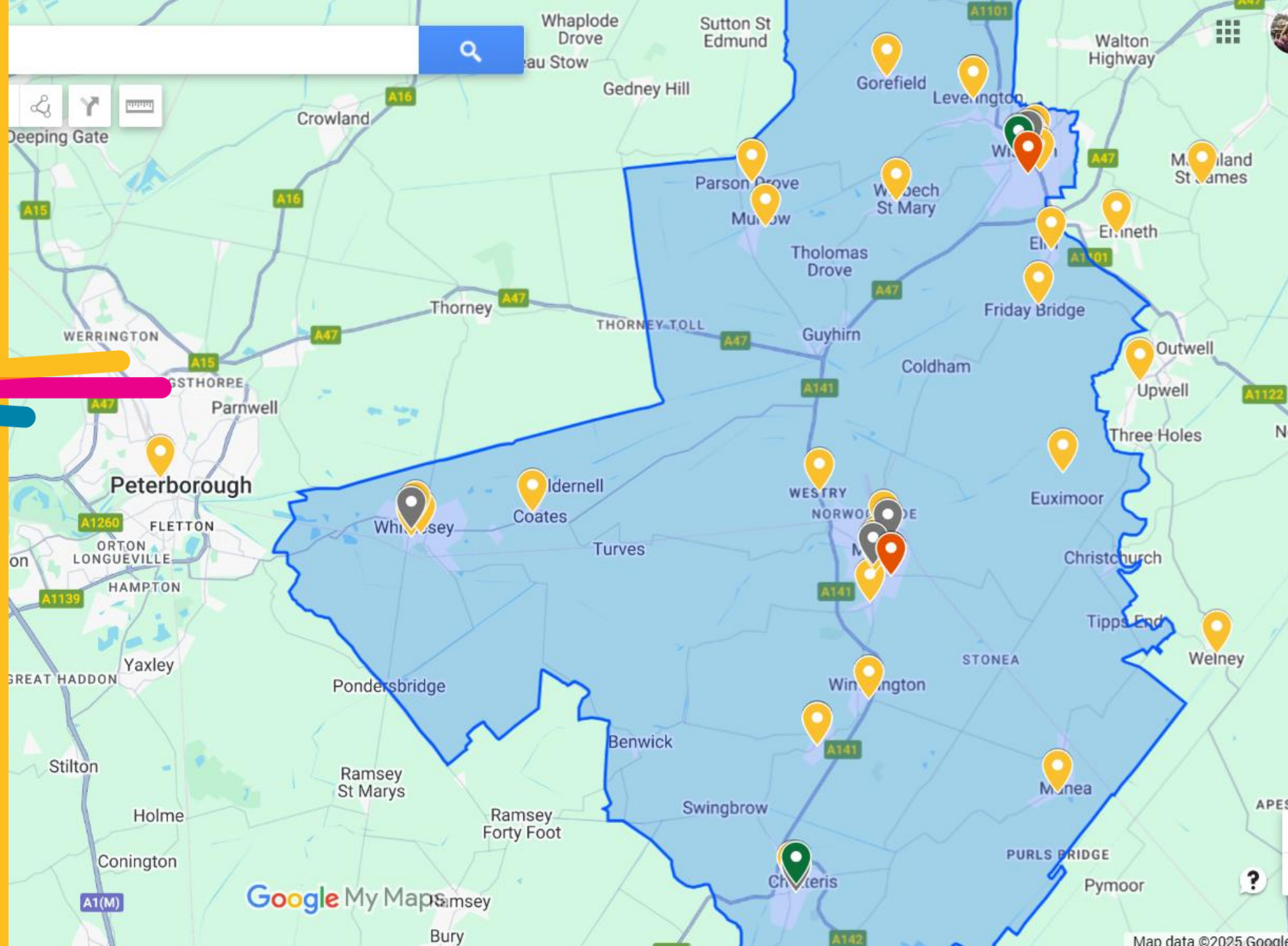

Family Hubs | Oldham Case Study

Our project will fund a Family Support Enabler to coordinate;

1. addressing gaps in provision for families by
 - a) renting room spaces in churches to start council run family hub services in new locations across the local authority
 - b) collaborating on a new project in churches in Saddleworth to deliver services for families
2. church leaders visiting their local council run Family centre for focussed discussions to explore collaboration
3. sharing updates about Oldham council Family hubs via a newsletter to church leaders
4. recruiting volunteers from churches to work alongside staff at family centres to support the delivery of services that build resilience in children and families
5. campaigns, harnessing the church network, on priority issues for children and families, for example oral health
6. assisting churches in developing new services supporting families e.g. using school readiness resources in parent and toddler groups.



Family Hubs | Oldham Case Study

1. Our project brings people together with our Enabler to build strong relationships in and across communities by using the contact database of 101 churches and Council Family Hubs team to facilitate collaborative working to support children and families.
2. improve the places and spaces that matter to communities by enhancing and developing services that support children and families in their communities at churches and family centres.
3. help more people to reach their potential, by supporting them at the earliest possible stage through the 381 services mapped in our Oldham church-based support for children and families in our communities.
4. support people, communities and organisations facing more demands and challenges because of the cost-of-living crisis through our signposting to services supporting families and children such as food security, mental health and specialist activities/groups for children and families.

We have completed a comprehensive telephone survey to all the 104 churches across Oldham local authority to map the services delivered for children and families and hear about the challenges and opportunities in every postcode and community across the area. These have captured the regular chats community leaders have had with community members on an every-day basis.

Our steering team is made up of church leaders, VCFSE leaders, local council leaders and people with lived experience of the issues we are addressing. Our project will use the contacts database to bring leaders, volunteers and community members together for focussed conversations around supporting children and families. Face-to-face communications will be coordinated by email and social media.

We will coordinate a network of networks to envision, equip and engage in supporting children and families. This will include utilising Open Days at council run family centres. We will also run a community engagement event, bringing together the community and community organisations to connect and network and catalyse collaborative working.
